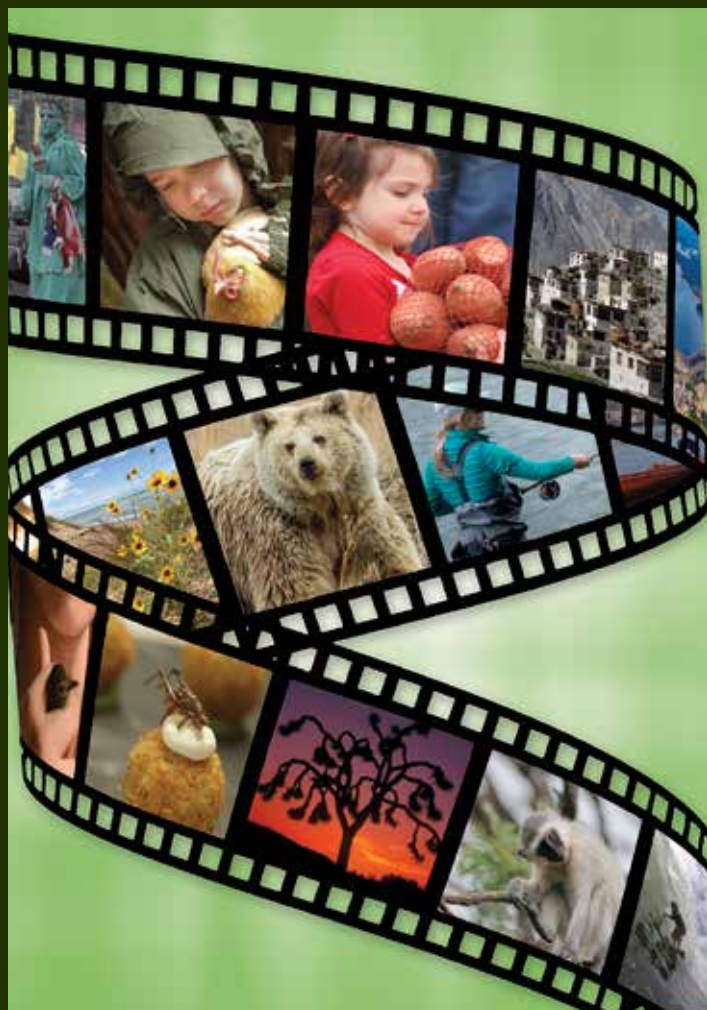

OPENING NIGHT KICKOFF

Our opening night of the festival celebrates eleven years of bringing the best environmental films in the world to Golden, Colorado. A small but dedicated group of volunteers have been hard at work once again to find and curate these films. The judges quickly discovered that the task of selecting films for this festival was almost impossible. We received over 140 films this year and the quality of filmmaking was remarkable. If you are able to attend any of the segments of films this year, you are in for a treat.

These passionate directors care deeply about the craft of storytelling and are zealous in their dedication to showing us the issues that affect us each and every day.

Tonight we will be sharing three films that are typical of the kind of films we will be showing throughout the festival. A short film, *Think Like a Scientist: Boundaries*, by director Nathan Dappen, documents a nature photographer who has spent the last seven years documenting the environmental effects of the U.S./Mexico border. Our second film, *A Ghost in the Making*, by directors Morgan Helm and Neil Losin, looks at the 4,000 species of native bees in North America, and our third film *American Psychosis*, by director Amanda Zackem, discusses modern day consumerism, totalitarian corporate power, and living in a culture dominated by pervasive illusion.

After the films, our host John Fielder, will moderate a panel discussion with film directors and leaders in the Colorado environmental movement. There will be time for questions and answers and interaction with the panel following the forum.

And one of the best parts of the Colorado Environmental Film Festival: we are still a small and intimate festival. We haven't outgrown our audience or location. We are informal and friendly and try to match our audiences with films that will make a difference in their lives – right here in Colorado. Take advantage of this and watch the films and meet the directors and interact with them – meet them after the films and in Golden and help them make a difference.

A Ghost in the Making *(19 minutes)*

Everyone has heard about bee declines, but with so much attention focused on domesticated honeybees, someone has to speak up for the 4,000 species of native bees in North America. This is a story that photographer Clay Bolt wanted to tell from the moment he learned of the rusty-patched bumble bee's tenuous existence. For Clay, the rusty-patched bumble bee is a living symbol for all the forgotten species out there.



A Plastic Ocean *(109 minutes)*

This film begins when journalist Craig Leeson, searching for the elusive blue whale, discovers plastic waste in what should be pristine ocean. In this adventure documentary, Craig teams up with free diver Tanya Streeter, and they travel to twenty locations around the world over the next four years. The team explores the fragile state of our oceans, uncovers alarming truths about plastic pollution, and reveals working solutions that can be put into immediate effect.

In the vast wilderness of Alaska the earth is changing, threatening the history and culture of native peoples, natural landscapes, and the habitats of wildlife. *Between Earth and Sky* examines how climate change is rapidly affecting Alaska, and will soon affect us all.

Nature has its Guardian and his name is Cernunnos. He seeks to maintain the cycle, where everything lives and dies, like a deer who loses his woods in winter to recover them in the summer. However, it would appear that a power far stronger than him has struck the world he must protect at the peril of his life.



Change for Chimps *(7 minutes)*

A young girl's love for chimpanzees sends her on a journey to raise funds to save chimps from captivity, in hopes to deliver the funds to her hero Dr. Jane Goodall.

Salmon and steelhead bring the power of the ocean a thousand miles inland, but they also bring signs of troubled times. Follow obsessed steelhead fly anglers as they await the migration.

City of Trees (74 minutes)

City of Trees tells a deeply personal story about the struggle to implement a high-stakes, stimulus-funded green job training program at the height of the recession. The film follows the point-of-view of three long-term unemployed DC residents hired by the program – Charles, Michael, and James – and Steve, the director tasked with managing the multi-million dollar stimulus grant.

For nearly four million Americans, fly fishing is a deep passion. All of the legendary trout streams across the US are sustained by cold water from the mountains, but in the wake of diminishing snowpack, catastrophic floods, and stream closures due to hot summer water,

legendary names in the fly fishing community like Yvon Chouinard, Craig Mathews, and Steve Hemkens, have something to say to fellow anglers.

Ethiopia Rising: Red Terror to Green Revolution (61 minutes)

Ethiopia is often portrayed as a land of drought and famine, but this film tells a different story. Through dramatic reconstruction and documentary footage it shows what is possible when a remote community in the far north of the country decides to stay on and transform their land.

Under the leadership of ‘The Man of Fire’, we witness their incredible struggle in the midst of drought and civil war. It’s the story of restored life and renewed hope.

From Flint: Voices Of A Poisoned City (2016)

This is the story of a older Aboriginal man being forced to adapt to a constantly changing world. Climate change has altered the way people live, bringing droughts and floods to previously unaffected areas. And yet, a man continues to live alone in the wilderness like his family before him.

documentary examines the destruction of our rivers, its effect on humanity, and the solutions that inspire hope for a sustainable future.

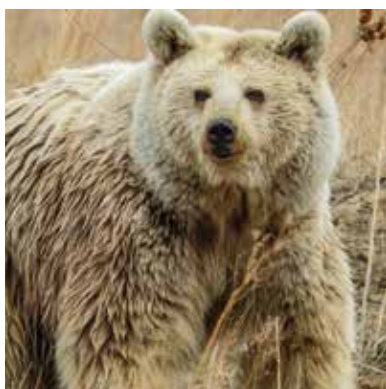


Sanctuary: Fifi (9 minutes)

Think Like A Scientist: Gorongosa *(7 minutes)*

In the 1960's Gorongosa National Park was one the best national parks in all of Africa. It's slogan was, 'Where Noah Left the Ark.' But, 30 years of war in Mozambique (first a war with Portugal for independence and a 15-year civil war) devastated the park. Gorongosa was

at the epicenter of the conflict and 95% of its wildlife were killed to feed the soldiers or poached for ivory to purchase more weapons. The war is over and a group of scientists, conservationists and Mozambicans are bringing back the park.
